# What do I choose as I want to go to university?

#### **Don't worry!**

You will already be taking GCSE courses in: -

- Science either Combined = 2 x GCSEs or separate sciences
   = 3 x GCSEs
- English Language & Literature = 2 x GCSEs
- Maths = 1 x GCSE
- French & RE = 2 x GCSEs

That is a total of 7 or 8 x GCSEs before you add your options! For Level 3 at college the most you would need would be 6 x GCSEs Grades 4 & 5 including Maths & English Language.

After Level 3 you can then look at university degree courses.

## So what do I need to consider when choosing my options?

\*\* You can often study these courses at college without having studied them at school \* To study any of these courses further at college you need to have taken a similar subject at school

# For one of my options I need to choose between Geography & History – Why is this?

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Your Option Choice has been determined by your current grades and your Options Coordinator is Mrs Launa-Hewage.

Alongside Maths, Sciences, English and Modern Foreign Languages, Geography and History are both considered as core GCSE subjects by universities.

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- History is a challenging subject that requires a good memory for dates and issues, and an analytical mind. You learn to question the reliability of sources, which makes it good for developing critical thinking skills that will be essential once you get to university.
- Geography is the study of the shape and features of the Earth's surface, including countries, vegetation, climates, how humans use the world's resources and the environmental impact that humans have on these resources.

#### Answers

FINAL ANSWER?

- 1. What GCSE grade is a pass grade? Grade 4.
- 2. Which subjects can you do a Technical (BTEC) qualification in? Dance, P.E., Health and Social Care, Music.
- 3. How is a Technical (BTEC) course different to GCSE? The work you do in a Technical (BTEC) course is always related to a vocational/work situation. The end of Year 11 examination is smaller but you do more controlled assessments. (BTECs are not easier- they just use a different way of learning.)
- 4. What is the difference between a Level 2 and a Level 3 qualification at college?

  Level 2 = GCSE grades -mainly 3s

  Level 3 = GCSE grades 4-9
- 5. What do you have to do at college if you have not got a grade 4 or above in English Language and/or Maths? If you have not achieved a Grade 4 or above in your English Language and/or Maths, you would continue with these GCSEs alongside a Level 2 course at college and retake these GCSEs.
- 6. What are CORE subjects and why do you have them? Core subjects are compulsory- they provide you with a solid foundation of skills and knowledge that will enable you to progress.
- 7. What other subjects will you cover? You will all cover PSHE in stop the clock sessions. You will all do PE and you will all have Careers education.

## **Optional subjects**

- These are the subjects that you can choose to apply to study.
- You will have 2 choices.
- You will have to choose 1 subject and a reserve from each column.
- You cannot choose the same subject twice e.g. you cannot do BTEC Sport and G.C.S.E. PE and Sport.
- Most of Year 9 will be recommended to take History or Geography in this case 1 of your choices must be History or Geography.




## Prepare any questions that you may have about choosing courses

- Think about what you want to know and then create a list of questions.
- Keep these in a safe place and make sure that you ask them and record the answers.
- Don't just find out about your two most likely choices. Compare these with other subjects so that you can make an informed choice.

Remember 'It's Your Choice'







- Remember it has to be one from each column.
   You should think about what you are interested in, what you are best at and what you need for the future.
  - What are your subject choices?
  - How are these courses assessed?
  - What sort of topics will you learn about?
  - Why are these choices suitable for you?
  - What sort of careers are these subjects useful for?
