1509

John Blanke performed at both Henry VII's funeral and Henry VIII's coronation.

Jacques Francis was the first black person to give a testimony in court.

Anne Boleyn was executed on charges of treason due to being accused of having affairs.



1540 Walter Hungerford was executed for charges including being a homosexual.



1545

Will Sommer appears in 'the ideal family' painting with Henry VIII and other Tudors.

## **Key Figures/People**

Rich and poor women had similar childhoods, including being baptised.

Tudor Women	Ů Å Ů	<ul> <li>Rich and poor women both had an opportunity to go to school.</li> <li>Rich women had less choice of marriage.</li> <li>Poor women often completed domestic service.</li> </ul>
John Blanke		<ul> <li>John Blanke was a black trumpeter who played at Henry VII's funeral and Henry VIII's coronation.</li> <li>He successfully petitioned for a pay rise.</li> <li>He likely converted to Christianity as he married in a Church.</li> </ul>
Jacques Francis		<ul> <li>Jacques Francis was a black salvage diver.</li> <li>He was the first black person to give a testimony in a European court.</li> <li>He was respected for his work salvaging from the Mary Rose.</li> </ul>
Will Sommer		<ul> <li>Will Sommer was a 'Kings Fool' which meant he had a mental disability.</li> <li>Henry VIII cared for him by gifting him expensive clothing and hiring a keeper.</li> <li>He was admired for his honesty and Henry VIII took advice from him.</li> </ul>
Walter		Walter Hungerford was the only man to be executed for charges including

being a homosexual in the Tudor Period.

Henry VIII made homosexuality a capital offence in 1533.
